AARP Fraud Watch Network

Triad has always had a special bond with AARP, as they were one of its founding members with the National Sheriffs' Association (NSA) and International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP).

One of the ways AARP works to protect us from Frauds and Scams is with the Fraud Watch Network.

Scammers operate in communities large and small across our nation, and vigilance against scammers is our number one weapon. The AARP Fraud Watch Network works to protect us in the fight against fraud by providing easy to access proven tools and resources. Everything they offer is free to everyone!

What does the Fraud Watch Network provide?

- Email Scam Alerts.
- A scam-tracking map featuring warnings from law enforcement and people in various communities, so we know who to watch out for.
- A phone number to call to talk to AARP volunteers trained in how to spot and report fraud.

Unemployment Scam

While this may not be a scam directly affecting our senior population, it may be one affecting family and friends. It happened to a friend of mine at work and he found out several local people had also been affected. How did he find out? He got a letter in the mail confirming the amount that he would be getting for unemployment benefits. Our HR Department also received a letter confirming his employment. A surprise to everyone! Lucky he called and checked first with HR and then with unemployment. He also talked with the Social Security Office and found out that he could put a lock on his account until he is actually ready to leave his employment.

Is a scammer getting unemployment benefits in your name? | FTC Consumer Information

In this article, it states that this large-scale scam erupted in the midst of the Coronavirus pandemic with imposters filing claims for unemployment benefits, using the names and personal informaiton of people who have not filed claims. People learn about the fraud when they get a notice from their state unemployment benefits office or their employer about their supposed application for benefits.

If this happens to you, it means someone is misusing your personal information, including your Social Security number and date of birth. **Act fast!**

Here are steps you can take to protect your credit:

- Report the fraud to your employer.
- Report the fraud to your state unemployment benefits agency.
- Visit <u>IdentityTheft.gov</u> to report the fraud to the FTC and get help with the next important recovery steps.
- Review your credit reports often.

Usually, the employment payments are deposted to accounts the imposters control. But sometimes, payments get sent to the real person's account instead. If this happens, they may pretend to be your state unemployment agency and say the money was sent by mistake. This is a money mule scam and participating in it could cause you more difficulties.

In summary, if you haven't applied for unemployment, report any unemployment benefits or benefit letters to your state unemployment agency immediately.

Recipe

Carmel Rolls
