
MANDT SYSTEM

Jail Programmer Nicole Torgerson.

A NOTE FROM THE INSIDE

Nicole Torgrimson has been employed at the Douglas County Sheriff's Office since July 1989. She has served as the jail programmer since fall 2008. That is when she first became involved with the REC program.

"REC had been an established program in our facility for almost a decade when I took over," Torgrimson said. "We feel fortunate to have our administration's support, and this fall we will celebrate our 20-year anniversary of hosting the REC program. We have held two RECs per year; except for two years, [when] only one was able to be scheduled. November 2019 we will host DCI #38."

Torgrimson said she has been a "cheerleader" for the program because she has seen its benefits firsthand.

"REC exemplifies why I became a programmer — to work with 'the least of these," she said. "Many of the people I work with have never felt unconditional love, never been introduced to Jesus Christ, never been allowed to feel worthy of love or that they can succeed. REC gives them that opportunity and sets an example to carry that with them to share with others."

Her role as the REC liaison is multifaceted. She works closely with REC coordinators deciding dates, number of attendees and volunteers, and facilitates background checks. During the REC weekend, she often tries to stay behind the scenes, helping make it as successful

as possible.

"I have noticed several
previous 'REC-ites' have been
able to make significant enough
life changes to stay out of jail or
at least have longer periods of
non-incarceration," Torgrimson
said. "After a REC, the jail staff also
comment how much quieter the
housing units are and that residents
are politer to staff and each other—
at least for a while. Some start their
own Bible study groups, have been

seen praying over other residents prior to release, and increase [their] attendance in other faith-based facility programs.

"It also gives me an opportunity to show the residents a different side of a jail programmer and not just 'the badge.' They seem much more willing to come in and visit with my partners and me, which allows us increased programming efforts as they transition

back into society."
This summer,
Torgrimson
celebrated a
milestone birthday
and also suffered
the loss of her
father. For both
occasions, the REC
family supported her.

"Several REC volunteers traveled to share my joy and again my sorrow," she recalled. "I know that if the residents reach out, the volunteers also continue to stay in contact with them, through REC-Connect, to lift them up during life's ups and downs. That is the kind of support and energy this program has, and I'm so blessed to be a part of it."

Navigate to the Divisions of the MSA section on the left sides and select MN Jail Programs and Services.


Click on the MJPS Forum to view the discussion board.
