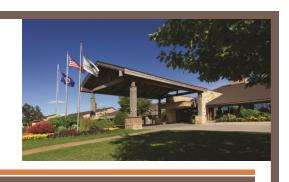

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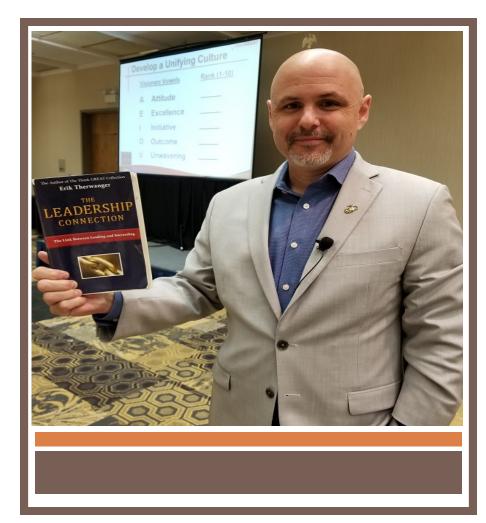

2018 Kay Siebrass Program of the Year Award

"Integrated Amrita Meditation"

In the summer of 2017, the Dakota County Jail implemented a new program for inmates. Understanding that the jail is a high-stress environment we wanted to implement a program that would teach inmates skills to manage their stress. Integrated Amrita Meditation (IAM) is facilitated every Friday afternoon by our two, dedicated volunteers, Arun Hejmadi and Patricia Lyall. This program instructs inmates on how to manage their stress response and reduce the levels of adrenaline and cortisol in their body through the combination of yoga, pranayama, and meditation. The instructors spend about an hour explaining and demonstrating the technique followed by twenty minutes of practice. The goal of the program is to help participants learn how to activate the left pre-frontal cortex and quiet the right pre-frontal cortex, leading to a more relaxed state and positive mood.

After several months of implementation, we are currently planning an internal evaluation, with support from psychology students at St. Catherine University, of the impact of IAM on our participants. Qualitatively, participants have reported benefits in concentration and sleep after practicing. Some participants even claim their basketball skills were sharper immediately after practicing the meditation techniques. We look forward to our continued partnership with our volunteers, and appreciate them giving us the opportunity to bring these skills to our population at no cost to us.
