Through implementation of at-risk screening, task analysis, and thorough communication along with a foundation of regulatory guidelines, teams can successfully predict and identify care needs. Interdisciplinary team buy-in will produce effective processes for quality care and outcomes – even during a pandemic.

Identifying Post COVID-19 Rehab Needs: Therapy Interventions to Improve Function and Reduce Recidivism

Physical, Occupational and Speech Therapies continued in skilled nursing/long-term care facilities through the thick of the pandemic. As we begin to ease our way through the effects of COVID-19 and gradually see the rate of illness decline in our communities, the importance of skilled therapy intervention as part of a personal recovery plan for our long-term care residents is paramount. The increased confinement due to sickness and attempts at prevention, isolation from family and community, and restrictions to physical movement and social interactions have greatly impacted the physical and mental wellbeing for so many in our care. This presentation will focus on identifying rehab needs following the effects of COVID-19 and offer suggestions for functional interventions and comprehensive strategies to reduce hospitalization and improve overall function.

COVID-19 & Beyond – How to Succeed in Caring for Long Haulers

While many COVID patients recover in a short period of time, others will continue to have lingering symptoms. This has led to the new industry term "long haulers." The ability to analyze your PDPM process is critical to maximize success with this type of caseload. Long haulers frequently experience fatigue, but many will have chest pain, cognitive changes, and neuropathies. Post-ICU syndrome can involve physical, mental, and emotional symptoms such as depression, memory issues and PTSD. This presentation will cover PDPM reimbursement and COVID-19 recovery programs developed to meet the needs of these individuals.
