It's All About Safety

Who You Gonna Call? LAW ENFORCEMENT

If your car broke down along the road or you went into the ditch, who would you call first? Gold star for you if you said "Law Enforcement" or "911."

Now, there may be some factors that come into play. What are the weather conditions? Is anyone hurt? Where you are at and what time of day.

What is the NUMBER 1 reason for you to call Law Enforcement first? They can get you the help you need faster.

When you call Law Enforcement directly,

- they have your location information;
- they can get you directly in touch with ambulance personnel;
- they immediately dispatch help to you.

AARP has some great Vehicle Breakdown Do's and Don'ts on their website, from when your vehicle trouble starts to pulling safely out of traffic and calling for help.

When you are safe, call for help.

- If you have a roadside assistance provider, give them a call.
- If you don't have a provider, call for a tow truck if you need further assistance, or call 911 if it is an emergency.
- If you don't have a cell phone, hang a white cloth or piece of paper out of your window and wait for the highway patrol.
- If you are driving alone at night, be careful about accepting help from strangers, and stay inside your car if you can. Make sure your doors are locked and your windows are up.

NUMBER 1 Travel Rule – Always carry a charged cell phone with you!

Recipe

Banana Bread

2 c flour	1 tsp baking soda
1/4 tsp salt	1/2 c butter
2 eggs, beaten	3/4 c brown sugar
2 1/3 c mashed overripe bananas	

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly grease a 9x5 inch loaf pan. In a large bowl, combine flour, baking soda and salt. In a separate bowl, cream together butter and brown sugar. Stir in eggs and mashed bananas until well blended. Stir banana mixture into flour mixture; stir just to moisten. Pour batter into prepared loaf pan. Bake for 60-65 minutes, until a toothpick into center of the loaf comes out clean. Let bread cool in pan for 10 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack.

It Actually Happened

Shared from one of our Triad Counties...

We took a 9-1-1 call from a someone that saw a young adult male walk around his neighbor's home, which was a seasonal lake home. He did not believe the neighbor was at the home during this time period and thought it suspicious and called 9-1-1. We had a deputy in the area not far away, who responded quickly and interrupted a burglary in progress, ultimately arresting the young adult male for breaking into the home. Had the neighbor not paid attention or not wanted to call 9-1-1, our call likely would have come from the lake home owner who arrived days or weeks later to find his home burglarized and things missing. It could have been very difficult for law enforcement to identify the criminal at that point, and the homeowner's belongings could have been missing, never to be found again.
