

Rules for the Susan P. Baker Public Health Impact Award

1. The award is based on the quality of the manuscript and the content and style of the platform presentation display. *The award is for platform presentations only; poster presentations are not eligible.* The work should be scientific, innovative, informative, and practical. The topic of the research must be related to forensic medicine/pathology or medicolegal death investigation.
2. The work should be applicable to the practice of forensic pathology and/or have an impact on public health, community awareness, prevention of disease or increasing awareness of a new disease phenomenon.

Additional specific judging criteria:

- Potential contribution to public health (surveillance; understanding the etiology, risk and/or protective factors of a public health problem; public health action – emergency response, intervention and policy development; or the evaluation of the impact of public health-related interventions and policies)
 - Evidence that the author has, or intends to translate this research into action that benefits public health (either directly or through partnership with public health and safety-related agencies and organizations)
 - Potential to contribute to increased appreciation in the forensic community for the role of forensic research in advancing public health.
3. The submitting author must indicate on the abstract submission site his/her desire for consideration for the Public Health Impact Award. The Program Chairman will decide the time allotment for all abstracts in the Public Health Impact Award competition. Submission of an abstract does NOT guarantee acceptance.
 4. The author presenting the platform must be the first author on the abstract and on the manuscript.
 5. The first author must be physically present to give the oral presentation during the NAME annual meeting.
 6. The abstract submission deadline date is established by the Program Chair.
 7. To qualify for the competition, a complete manuscript **MUST** also be submitted. The manuscript should be written in accordance with the guidelines set forth for submission to *Academic Forensic Pathology (AFP)*. The complete manuscript must be submitted to Denise McNally via email at: name@thename.org no later than one week prior to the opening date of the annual meeting. **Any manuscripts received after this deadline will result in ineligibility for the award;** however, the presentation will be allowed to be given.

8. The presenting author must pay the meeting general registration fee. NAME will not be responsible for the cost of transportation to or accommodations at the meeting.
9. A minimum panel of three judges (ad-hoc committee members who are not co-authors on any of the submitted abstracts) will be present at the meeting to judge the presentations. At least five committee members will review the written papers and submit a score to the attending judges. The award recipients will be determined by the committee during the meeting. The President of NAME will be informed of the results and an appropriate award ceremony will be organized in conjunction with the ad hoc committee chairman or his/her appointed designee.
10. The award (1) shall be five-hundred (\$500) dollars for the Best Platform presentation.
11. All presenters are encouraged to submit their manuscript for publication. *Academic Forensic Pathology (aFP)* has the first right of publication of all manuscripts associated with the Susan P. Baker Public Health Impact Award Competition; *however, submission of a manuscript does not guarantee publication in aFP.*
